

ate last year, we commenced a project with funding support from the Norwegian Embassy and UN Women, aimed at strengthening the capacity, advocacy and local engagements of community women in Kaduna (Jama'aa, Kaduna North, Kaduna South, Igabi, Chikun, Kajuru and Zaria LGAs) and Plateau States (Wase, Mangu, Riyom and Jos North). These wonderful women have been equipped with digital, conflict mediation and advocacy skills, which have helped them become ambassadors for Women in Peace and Security.

With our project far from over, we have seen how the community women have made practical



efforts in their various communities. CLEEN Foundation will continue to shine a spotlight on them. So far, their step-down activities have ranged from sensitization and capacity building, Conflict mediation involving the Nigeria Police Force, Muslim and Christian community sensitization, Primary and Secondary school outreach, Peace walk in commemoration of International womens day, Radio and Live television programs providing insight on the project and advocating for women inclusion in decision making, Visit to traditional and community representatives, meeting with Youth representatives and other security agencies like the vigilante groups, virtual discussions and so much more. Last year, CLEEN and ICCEF partnered to launch the maiden edition of the Innocent Chukwuma Annual Impact & Legacy lecture series; an event designed to bring together civil society representatives, policy makers, stakeholders, government and security agencies, development partners, donor organisations and friends, with shared values, listen to an inspiring guest lecture delivery, get involved in panelist discussions, share views, ask questions and network. It also serves as a tribute to late Innocent Chukwuma, who was a force in the fields of justice sector reform, youth empowerment and public safety.

The guest speaker for this year, His Eminence, Bishop Mathew Kukah, of the Catholic Diocese of Sokoto, titled his lecture "The Power of One; Dreams & Nightmares: Thoughts on Innocent Chukwuma." One man, Innocent Chukwuma, made a difference, impacted his world, and left an enduring legacy. The lecture underscored

the significance of individual agency in shaping our collective future. According to the Bishop, the late Innocent took up a passionate commitment and we must continue to push the frontiers that brought greatness to Nigeria.

Indeed, memorials are only for those who make impact, irrespective of age or social status. He also noted that the efforts of Professor Etannibi Alemika, Kemi Okenyodo, Kole Shettima and the MacArthur Foundation also brought into Nigeria one of the best police officers in the world who ignited conversations about community partnership in deepening internal security management. CLEEN Foundations' Quarterly Monitoring Visit on the utilization of Recovered Assets

n continuation of CLEEN Foundation's mandate, we have ensured accountability and effective utilization of recovered and repatriated assets from the US Government in partnership with the Federal Ministry of Justice, popularly called the "Abacha loot". For every visit, our team members inspect the progression of work done on the Kaduna - Zaria, Kano Express Ways and the Lagos-Ibadan Express Ways.

Part of the observations our team made were on

the general state of aftermaintenance. The good people of Nigeria are encouraged to see the project and National infrastructure



as something for their benefit and not stall the process through dumping refuse, blocking drainages and theft of protective ironware. Per the progression, The Julius Berger contractors, who are responsible for this project, provided an update at their Zaria Yard, before the site inspection proper. Work has been substantively completed along the Lagos Ibadan Expressway, which is also being handled by Julius Berger, and then the Shagamu - Ibadan axis (Section II) which is handled by RCC is at

UN Women WPS (Women in Peace & Security) Network Mid-Term Review Workshop with CLEEN Foundation and Women Mediators

UN h e Women conducted a mid-term review workshop for the Women Peace and Security (WPS) Norway Project. The overall objective of the review was to assess the progress made, analyze the



challenges encountered and discuss sustainability of project activities. In both Kaduna (29th-30th April) and Plateau (24th-25th April) States, the team held a strategy meeting with the respective Commissioners and Legislators in House of Assembly on State Action Plans (SAPs). As a result of this meeting, our team and partners were able to gather feedback from

diverse stakeholders and partners, including implementing partners, government structures. traditional/religious leaders, security sector institutions. academia and representatives from the communities to understand their perspectives on the programme. We were

also able to Identify programmatic challenges vis a vis best practices. The workshop involved plenary discussions, as well as group presentations. The workshop was facilitated by UN Women staff in Nigeria with CLEEN Foundation staff in attendance. Work underway to build upon the recommendations from the sessions.

odern technologies are indeed a powerful tool to achieving sustainable development goals across all areas, most especially with security. How can we bridge the gap between our current technology strategies as a country with the onset of artificial intelligence, biometric data bases, advanced information technology and social networking? How can we galvanize these technological advancements in our National security agencies? It has become very critical to raise awareness on this topic.

CLEEN Foundation in collaboration with Oluaka Institute of Technology held a virtual dialogue on the 30th of April, to draw national attention to the significance of technology innovation in assessing, managing, and responding to security challenges in Nigeria. More specifically, to advance its integration in Nigeria's police reform, to identify and expose the current gaps in Nigeria's security approach and to segue into adoption of these initiatives. Our speakers, Olalare Adeyemi Johnson, rector of Oluaka Institute, led the presentation on "Leveraging Surveillance Technologies" and it was followed by the panel discussion by our Senior IT officer at



CLEEN, Dr. Akinremi Gabriel and the Director of programmes, Salaudeen Hashim. Indeed, Strategic communication cannot be achieved without the technological advancements to function properly and there is a need to address the deficit, in terms of Nigerias' Infrastructure & Accountability. The insightful conversations brought forth recommendations around the need for training, improved technological initiatives, financial reserves and tracking, specialisation and sustenance.
